President's Letter

Spring is here! As I write this, we are finally beginning to have days for gardening. Also it's time to start looking for new homes for items no longer needed by you and for you to take advantage of our annual ITHA Garage Sale scheduled for May 11th. Please see the included RSVP form to sign up.

While it may have been a long wet winter, your Board has been hard at work. The new year has brought fresh attempts in our State House to remove local control over residential zoning and single family neighborhoods. Two bills in particular are so disconcerting that besides the letters we have written, I am asking you to join us in opposition. Senate Bill 50 authored by our own Senator Scott Weiner is his attempt at a redux of SB827 that we successfully opposed last year. This year he has changed tactics. Instead of a frontal assault at overriding local zoning, this bill gives developers state-based rights to construct multi-unit dwellings up to 55'. Additionally, in the case of 1/4 mi of a transit corridor, such as Ocean Avenue which includes Ingleside Terraces, the height can extend to 85' with the State Density Bonus passed in 2015 and updated for this year. Height isn't the only dimension that is extended. Floor Area Ratio has been increased to 3.25 which means rear yards and setbacks are not off limits. The net result is the state is providing developers a "build-by-right" capability virtually anywhere in the City and eliminates any concept of a protected single family neighborhood.

This assault continues with Assembly Member Phil Ting's AB 68. This bill prohibits the City from restricting any accessory dwelling units (ADUs) that can be built anywhere on your lot with only a 4' setback that is at least 800 sq. ft. and is 16' in height. What this means is that a typical San Francisco lot with previously unbuildable backyards can now add 2 ADUs if so inclined and neither the City nor neighbors have the power to prevent this. This is on top of the inside ADU or in-law unit the City already allows. Neither of these bills concern themselves with the impact on utilities, transportation, parking, emergency services, etc. They naively assume that these fixed and limited resources will simply be there in the neighborhood.

Just as we did last year this misguided effort can be stopped, but it is going to need our legislators hearing from you. I have placed on our website, www.ithasf.org in our Community News section both reference material and

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examples of letters myself and others have written in opposition. I use the term "misguided" because many who support this density effort consider housing a commodity. As such it doesn't matter where it is located or what its density is as housing is interchangeable – four walls and a roof. People do not move to or desire to live in cities and states – they choose communities and neighborhoods. Density is a major factor in that decision and significantly impacts the quality of life, character or desirability of a neighborhood. If you value our community, please act today. Write or phone our legislators. Contact information is also included on the website; however, for those who don't procrastinate, Senator Weiner's number is 916-651-2011 and Assembly Member Ting's is 916-319-2019.

Now, is there a right way to deal with the housing problem? I maintain there is – work the local level. Many of you may remember that we passed a housing bond in 2015 to build 30,000 new homes by the end of 2020. This is being done, and we will have 25,000 of those by the end of this year. We are not stopping there. I have been asked and have accepted to join Mayor Breed's and BOS President Yee's committee to craft a new Affordable Housing bond for this November's ballot that will be \$500M without raising taxes. This effort will cross all housing affordability classes – low income, middle income/affordable, senior and HOME-SF. I am pleased to be able to join our fellow neighbor and SF Planning Commission president, Myrna Melgar who's is leading the middle income/affordable committee. We need your help to keep this effort on track and locally run by our community and responsible to our community.

Creative fare at Lucho's Restaurant

Lucho's opened in September, 2018 at 2675 Ocean Ave (at 19th Avenue), offers delicious traditional Mexican food in a cozy space around a sparkling open kitchen. Its eponymous co-owner and chef grew up on a farm in the Yucatán region and has been cooking in Bay Area restaurants his whole adult life, most recently as chef de cuisine at Brenda's French Soul Food in San Francisco.

Your humble reviewers disagree on many things. But we are unanimous in our belief that Lucho's serves the best breakfast and brunch near the Terraces, with downright delicious buttermilk pancakes (huge, mildly spiced, with generous supplies of real maple syrup), sublime poached eggs in a pumpkin-seed sauce, a reliably tasty breakfast burrito, and addicting beignet-like buñuelos. Lunch specialties include conchita pibil (pork marinated in citrus juice, achiote paste and slow-roasted in banana leaves) and pozole, a traditional hominy soup. Even if the food were not as good as it is, Lucho's would still beckon for its warm, welcoming family-kitchen vibe. Our only complaint has been that this family-operated place has been limited to breakfast and lunch. But that is changing: Beginning in March, Lucho's serves dinner from 5-9 on Wednesday-Sunday, offering traditional Mexican and Yucatanian fare.
